# Social Studies 10–1 – PERSPECTIVES ON GLOBALIZATION

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### **GOAL OF SOCIAL STUDIES**

The overall goal of all Social Studies is to provide opportunities for students to develop the attitudes, skills and knowledge that will enable them to become engaged, active, informed and responsible citizens. Recognition and respect for individual and collective identity is essential in a pluralistic and democratic society. Social studies helps students develop their sense of self and community, encouraging them to affirm their place as citizens in an inclusive, democratic society.

### OVERVIEW OF 10-1:

Students will explore multiple perspectives on the origin of globalization and the local, national and international impacts of globalization on lands, cultures, economies, human rights and quality of life. Students will examine the relationships among globalization, citizenship and identity to enhance skills for citizenship in a globalizing world. The infusion of multiple perspectives will allow students to examine the effects of globalization on peoples in Canada and throughout the world, including the impact on Aboriginal and Francophone communities.

#### **KEY AND RELATED ISSUES:**

Recognizing and appreciating the influence of globalization will lead students to develop individual and collective responses to the following key and related issues:

Key Issue: To what extent should we embrace globalization?

#### **Related Issues:**

- 1. To what extent should globalization shape identity?
- 2. To what extent should contemporary society respond to the legacies of historical globalization?
- 3. To what extent does globalization contribute to sustainable prosperity for all people?
- 4. To what extent should I, as a citizen, respond to globalization?
