#### MESSAGE FROM SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Completing the SARR (School Annual Results Report) is always a great opportunity to reflect on the past school year. Reviewing data gathered through the APORI provincial accountability survey, provincial assessment results and most importantly discussions with students, parents and teachers gives insight to how the school is doing from multiple perspectives.

Aligning with the division to focus on developing numeracy and literacy skills Bow Valley created two new courses to help focus on the fundamentals of Math and English. These courses build basics needed to be successful in High School and meet students where they are entering Bow Valley. In addition teachers have continued to develop skills in differentiating instruction and assessment aligning with divisional initiatives to provide a Universal learning environment.

To develop life skills and employability, Bow valley was supported in development of an off campus Work experience class where students are give opportunity to develop skills in an authentic setting. Our inaugural year with our grade ten "Building Futures" program is another example of successful place-based authentic learning.

Rocky View Schools' involvement in "High School Redesign" has allowed Bow Valley To embed the CALM (Career and Life Management) course into existing core courses. The connection between the learning objectives has made the learning in these courses more relevant and therefore more meaningful for students. Our objective to have students and staff more engaged in the courses as a result. Students were able to experience credit recovery and/or rescue to bolster their knowledge in specific course content to raise achievement and potentially avoid having to repeat an entire course.

The strength at Bow Valley continues to be a result of following our foundational statements on a daily basis. The personal connections fostered amongst our learning community members and the shared value of servant leadership is felt by everyone who enters the building.

We rate at the highest level in the categories of "Safe and Caring" and "Citizenship." We are very proud of this as well as our very high completion rates and very low drop out rates. We see a pattern of increasing achievement from grade nine to twelve and score high in transition of students from Bow Valley to life beyond High School.

Bow Valley will continually strive to improve in all areas. The School Annual Results Report is a valued document to keep the school's stakeholders informed on achievements over the year and direction for the upcoming year. ### **OVERVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS**

### Goal One – Learners have their individual needs met

Bow Valley's vision to be a leader in learner engagement and well being is reflected in the APORI provincial survey results where 89% of students feel the school is a "Safe and Caring environment". A combination of a very low drop out rate of 1.1% and a very high completion rate of 83.8% are results that we are very proud of and will strive to maintain or improve upon. Access to supports in choosing courses and planning for transition after High School were reported to be at 84% and 82% respectively. Daily access to get help with work was reported even higher at 91%.

The results can be attributed combination of initiatives. All staff have been tracking the progress of their professional learning through their Teacher Professional Growth Plans that document progress throughout the year. We also have a celebration of results where teachers can share what they are doing to make a difference. The teacher's success empowers them to continue in a positive direction that shows in our results. Credit recovery/rescue has been successful in 80% of the situations that it was put in place saving time and effort to gain these students the course credit. Building futures will continue for the next 5-6 years based on the success of our pilot year.

These reported results would have been a contributor to Bow Valley students being above the provincial average in percentage of students that are achieving acceptable standard on Diploma Exams.

#### Goal Two - Learners are self-directed, innovative, ecologically intelligent and entrepreneurial.

Inquiry based project work as seen in our "Building Futures" program and cross-curricular planning That is occurring in our embedded CALM (Career and life management) initiative has given learners the opportunity to be more self-directed in their learning. Students report 91% of the time that the overall education at BVHS is good or very good indicating that they are responding to the work being done in teacher planning. Quality of teaching also scored a very high 93% as good or very good in the provincial APORI survey of students, our highest percentage in the past 4 years.

This year has seen the highest number of students enrolled in entrepreneur courses on line in We Connect. Special projects that allow students to explore areas of interest beyond the prescribed curriculum have significantly increased with many of these courses being completed in conjunction with the student leadership programs offered at BVHS.

#### Goal Three – Instructional design challenges and engages each learner.

Bow Valley has built a positive reputation as one of the top student leadership programs in the country. The principles of servant leadership that are practiced on a daily basis have strengthened student character and given authentic experience for students to become strong citizens and advocates for others. The development of soft skills such as personal advocacy and empathy toward others are important side benefits to the core curricular objectives targeted in our programs. 87% if students report that they are encouraged to do their best. Improvement in related areas include lifelong learning, citizenship and workplace preparation.

The reporting that 74% of Parents and Teachers feel the quality at BVHS has improved or remained the same over the past 3 years supports evidence that BVHS is continuing to make progress in these critical areas.

#### Goal Four – Learning environments enable the acquisition of 21<sup>st</sup> C Competencies.

Civic engagement and critical thinking skills have been put into practice in a variety of BVHS initiatives. The annual Students for Change fundraiser give students authentic experiences in having to address local

issues and problem solve around how to best address concerns. Leadership initiatives and placed based learning in programs such as "Building Futures" require students to hone and utilize 21<sup>st</sup> Century Competencies. 70% of the students report that they are encouraged to get involved in the community. Teaching staff are encouraged to include a way to build 21st Century Competencies into their Teacher Professional growth plans showing the commitment of the staff to continue the development in this area.

### PRIORITY AREAS FOR FUTURE SCHOOL EDUCATION PLANS

### Goal One – Learners are successful.

Bow Valley will continue to focus on PAT results in the Acceptable and Excellence level BVHS has started numeracy and literacy targeted programming to meet learners where they are entering BVHS. The fundamentals in ELA and MATH Fundamentals classes utilize technologies such as Read, Write, Google and literacy programs such as read 180 to support individuals requiring additional support in these areas.

Programs like "Building Futures" and our work experience programs have allowed students to experience success in a variety of settings. Our work around student support has helped in removing barriers to learning allowing for students to be available to learn without distraction.

### Goal Two – Learners are engaged.

Extensive time and resources have been dedicated to support learners that are struggling with mental health concerns or are dealing with social emotional issues that can create barriers to learning. The use of diagnostic tools such as the SOSQ (Student orientation to school questionnaire) have assisted in targeting individuals with support that directly aligns in areas that the individuals have identified themselves. The result of this targeted intervention has contributed to the low drop out rates and high graduation rates. This work has also been supported by the increased engagement factors reported. Increased need in this area has made it a priority to focus on for upcoming School Education Plans.

Continued attention to teacher development in the areas of inquiry based and/or project based learning in conjunction with teacher professional learning will assist teacher along the evolving road to improving practice that meets the needs of today's learners.

High School Redesign initiatives have supported school in becoming creative and innovated in altering traditional practices to change how teachers teach and how students learn. Valuable authentic learning opportunities and place-based learning opportunities have expanded the skills acquired and the connections made to the learning in the classroom.

### Goal Three – Learners are supported.

Bow Valley over the last few years has established stronger working relationships with the student services sector, providing more efficient and productive communication and action plans to support students. The evolution of IPP development through our Student Resource Group and collaboration with division-based supports will result in stronger program planning to meet Individual needs. With this in place students will be better equipped to succeed and more willing to engaged in learning. We continue to focus on building student self-advocacy and problem solving skills. The addition of in school group therapy offerings such as Healthy Relationships, Deal with It (Anxiety), Emotional Regulation and Social Skills have been extremely beneficial. Our Family School Liaison Officers and RCMP supports have also assisted in supporting students.
